## **General Plan Basics**

- Required since 1937
- Expresses City's policy on land use
- "Comprehensive" =
  - covers entire city
  - covers all topics related to physical development
- "Long-range" (15-25 years)
- Includes narrative ("elements") and diagrams (maps)
- Subject to CEQA

## **Plan Elements**

#### Mandatory Elements

- Land Use
- Circulation
- Housing
- Open Space
- Conservation
- Safety
- Noise

#### **Optional Elements (examples)**

- □ Community Services and Facilities
- Parks and Recreation
- Infrastructure
- Economic Development
- Historic Preservation
- Community Design

# General Plan Basics Goal "A range of transportation choices for Albany residents." Policy "Maintain a connected system of bike routes and

lanes that make it possible to travel around Albany without a private automobile."

#### Action

"Provide additional bike racks at City Hall by 2015."



# Why Update the Plan?

- Existing Plan is now 20+ years old
- Does not reflect recent city plans, studies, programs
- Does not reflect new legal mandates and requirements
- Does not reflect new issues or changing philosophies since 1992
- Many of the action programs have been completed
- Document itself is not "user friendly"--lacks compelling graphics and has a dated quality





#### **General Plan Environmental Impact Report**

- Evaluates impact of General Plan 20year "buildout" on roads, environment, services, aesthetics, etc.
- Focuses on land use map changes
- Includes setting, impacts, mitigation measures
- Considers alternatives to the proposed Plan, including "no project"
- General Plan is designed to be "self-mitigating"

# **Sustainability in Existing Plan**

- Encourage non-auto modes of travel
- Improve air and water quality
- Protect vegetation and wildlife
- Conserve creeks, shoreline, and Albany Hill
- Plan for rising sea level
- Create diverse housing choices
