## **General Plan Basics**

- Required since 1937
- Expresses City's policy on land use
- "Comprehensive" =
  - covers entire city
  - covers all topics related to physical development
- "Long-range" (15-25 years)
- Includes narrative ("elements") and diagrams (maps)
- Subject to CEQA


#### **Mandatory Elements**

- Land Use
- Circulation
- Housing
- Open Space
- Conservation
- Safety
- Noise

Cities may also add "optional elements"

## **General Plan Basics**

- Goal
  - "A range of transportation choices for Albany residents."
- Policy
  - "Maintain a connected system of bike routes and lanes that make it possible to travel around Albany without a private automobile."
- Action
  - "Provide additional bike racks at City Hall by 2015."



## Why Update the Plan?

- Existing Plan is now 20+ years old
- Does not reflect recent city plans, studies, programs
- Does not reflect new legal mandates and requirements
- Does not reflect new issues or changing philosophies since 1992
- Many of the action programs have been completed
- Document itself is not "user friendly"--lacks compelling graphics and has a dated quality



# Conservation, Recreation, and Open Space Element Highlights

### Provides policy directives to:

- Enhance natural features of creeks
- Increase tree planting
- Preserve the crest of Albany Hill
- Preserve the waterfront as place of scenic beauty
- Develop as much parkland as possible
- Balance private and public uses at waterfront
- Increase child care and senior services
- Provide for public art

## What's Missing?

- Recommendations of the 2004 Parks and Recreation Master Plan
- Recognition of:
  - improvements over the last 20 years
  - new opportunities
  - new limitations and constraints
  - changing trends in service delivery
  - demographic trends and impacts on needs
- Discussion of new and emerging issues

## Typical Topics Covered in a General Plan Parks/Rec Element

- Park classification (community, neighborhood, etc.)
- Service standards (acres per 1,000 residents)
- New park opportunities
- Balancing competing demands for park space
- Siting guidelines for new facilities
- Responding to changes in service demand
- Park safety and maintenance
- Joint use of school facilities
- Role of other facilities in supplementing City parks

### **Incorporating the 2004 Master Plan**

### Policies address:

- Park acreage and standards
- Cultural arts programming
- Sports and recreation facilities
- Waterfront recreation and access
- Pedestrian and bicycle trails
- Maintenance and service delivery
